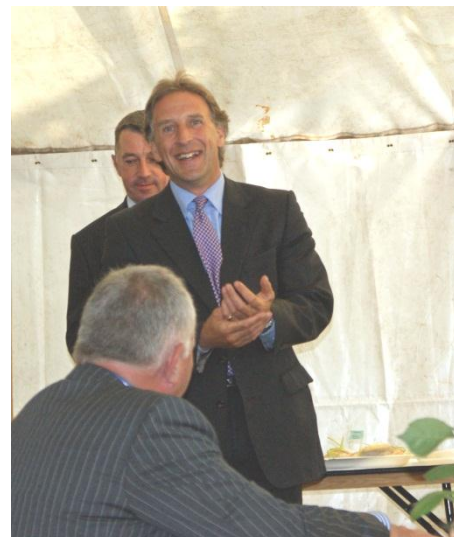

Report on the future of the Horse Trials

'2011 was the last year of the horse trials at Beckwithshaw, the hunt's five year agreement with the land owner, Jill Fraser, having come to an end. The final weekend at Beckwithshaw went extremely well, with lots of help from supporters and sponsors. Entries across the B.E. calendar have been hit hard this year and Beckwithshaw was no exception. However, due to the tight rein we had on costs we achieved a satisfying end result which, in accordance with the wishes of Jill Fraser, enabled us to make donations to the Air Ambulance and St Michael's Hospice.

The last five years have been a huge learning curve for all those involved with the Horse Trials, and we all would like to thank Jill for the opportunity she has given us.

For 2012 we have secured a move to Frickley Park with a September date being allocated to us by B.E. This move provides us with a chance to put on a popular and larger event. Since the first year of Beckwithshaw in 2007, horse trials have developed significantly and whilst Beckwithshaw was initially very successful, competing events have developed and, in some cases, overtaken us in what they offer. The move to Frickley Park will enable us to compete with other events e.g. Allerton, Aske and Thornton Watlass by allowing us to provide a greater range of classes and more facilities. This should provide for good levels of entries and successful events. So, whilst 2011 /2012 will be a busy year for the Horse Trials Committee, we are confident the move to Frickley Park will be successful.'

Harold Knight – Born a Yorkshireman

We've received the sad news from Devon of the death of Harold Knight aged 95.

Born in 1913, Mr Knight (Harold) grew up in Horbury and began his hunting at the early age of 11 by cycling to the Badsworth Meets whenever possible. On gaining a science degree from Leeds a distinguished naval career followed.

On completion of service, Harold became involved in rural life and became well known in the Yorkshire 'horse world' especially amongst the hunting and racing fraternity and for his interests in saddlery and horse feed.

Later in life, Harold continued to ride to hounds in other parts of the U.K. but principally on Dartmoor, where he became well respected in hunting circles. He was connected with several foxhound and beagle packs, writing as the well-known hunting correspondent, 'Westcombe' as well as being President of the Devon & Cornwall Minkhounds.

Mr Knight had a long and lasting affection for the Badsworth and for hunting in Yorkshire: he last visited several years ago when Harold and his daughter Sarah attended the Meet at Frickley.

Our condolences go to the family.

Maurice Terry

The death of Maurice Terry was announced at the end of August 2011. Maurice was a long time, loyal Supporter of the Bramham Moor, he will be sadly missed.

John Michael Green 1934-2011

The death occurred in the late summer of Michael Green, a stalwart and long-serving officer of the Bramham Moor. He was Hunt Secretary from the seventies until 1982 when he was elected Chairman in which capacity he served until 1986. After he finished hunting he stayed involved for some considerable time and he and his wife Morag attended many social functions.

Michael was born in Keighley and attended Keighley Grammar School where he became Head Boy. He decided early that he wanted to be a vet and qualified at Bristol University. He set up his practice in the Keighley area and was soon a well-known and respected vet.

He got into hunting by way of beagling and was well known as a capable rider across country, but he never let that interfere with his efficiency at collecting the Cap. I well remember one day, not long after I started hunting, when I was unable to get out hunting until very late but just at the start of a memorable run across the best of Weeton Country. As we sat, exhausted, on our heaving, steaming horses Michael came up to me and said 'I wouldn't normally take a Cap after two O'clock, but as you've had such a good run, I'm sure you won't mind paying'. He was right.

Since 1966 Michael had been involved in the Masonic movement, serving as an assistant provision Grand Master.

A Service of Thanksgiving was held at Kildwick Church at the end of August which was attended by former and current Members and Supporters of the Badsworth & Bramham Moor.

I understand that Michael's sad death may not be the last of the Green family involvement with us as I understand that a member of the next generation of Greens may be taking the Field and hunting with us.

George 7th Earl of Harewood

The recent death of George, 7th Earl of Harewood was widely reported by the Yorkshire Television and in the local and national press. A Service of Thanksgiving was held at All Saints' Church, Harewood on the 30th September 2011.

A message has been received from Harewood House: *'Patricia, Countess of Harewood and the family have been overwhelmed by the great numbers of letters, cards and flowers they have received and she sends you her warmest thanks for your kindness at this sad time.'*

There have been many Masters connected with the Badsworth & Bramham Moor since the founding of both hunts in the early 1700's. Through the history of the Bramham Moor, the Lascelles of Harewood have been connected, as MFH and otherwise, for 223 years. Mr Edward Lascelles MFH 1788 – 1798: Henry 2nd Earl of Harewood MFH 1819 -1841: Henry 3rd Earl of Harewood MFH 1841-1848. Over the early years, the connection with the Bramham Moor was so strong that the definitive History of the Bramham Moor Hunt, written by William Scarth Dixon and published in 1898, devoted a full chapter to 'The Bramham Moor *Under the Earls of Harewood*' the chapter introduces *'the very interesting part of the history of the pack when it was kennelled at Harewood.'*

Scarth Dixon writes- *'Nimrod* twice set out to see Lord Harewood's hounds: but never got to see them either time.'*

Nimrod was disappointed in not seeing Lord Harewood's hounds as it is an old-established pack. The first visit made during the early years of the Mastership of the second Lord Harewood, failed due to 'a strange thing happening' – three or four couple of hounds fell into a rapid mill stream and a young gentleman named Markham gallantly plunged in to their assistance narrowly escaping drowning. Mr Markham was the same man

who afterwards distinguished himself in India and unfortunately died in the Crimea. Nimrod's second visit failed due to the entire Field being driven back by a snowstorm.

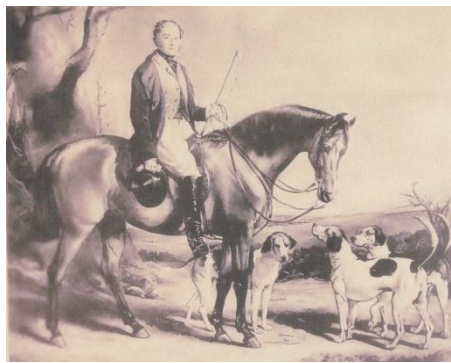
(* Nimrod was a famous leading Hunting Reporter of the 1800's)

Nimrod also reports a long, good run of 3 hours under the Mastership of the Second Lord Harewood, on Monday 25th November 1822 – from Tadcaster Bar ending in Hay Park near Knaresborough. Following this run on the map makes one wish that there were more like it nowadays.

Scarth Dixon continues – *'The Second Lord Harewood MFH was a keen sportsman, like most members of his family, and he came forward at a very opportune moment to carry on the hounds. He was not a scientific hound-breeder, indeed for that part he cared little, but he was very painstaking in hunting the country thoroughly and no day was too long for him – he stayed to the end.*

Lord Harewood was succeeded by his son Henry 3rd earl of Harewood, as a Master.

One severe long run over big country is reported: it was noted that Mr George E. Lascelles of Sion Hill, got to the end when many had given up, due to the fact that he borrowed the kennel-pony. Mr Lascelles then declined all offers of hospitality at the end of the run at Chestnut Grove and rode home from Nun Appleton with the huntsman and hounds to arrive back late at night and in the dark.



Throughout the tenure of the Lord(s) of Harewood, there are several detailed, extended reports of the excellent runs and the quality of the hounds. On his retirement from the Mastership in 1848, Lord Harewood was presented with a portrait of himself, in recognition of the service his father and he had rendered to the Hunt Country during the 26 years of their Mastership. The portrait depicts Lord Harewood mounted on George, who was supposed to be the best hunter in the country in his day. The terrier shown was a pure bred Dandie Dinmont and was a present from Sir Walter Scott. The terrier called Pepper was a famous dog of the time, and went all distances with hounds: when he could not travel home, he would quarter himself on some farmer for the night, and return home in the morning. Pepper is buried in the east garden at Harewood.

In later, more recent years, the Lascelles family continued to be closely connected with the Bramham Moor – Viscount Lascelles MFH 1921 – 1922: The 6th Earl of Harewood MFH 1922 – 1932: Major Hon. E Lascelles MFH 1931 -1935

- **Always turn your horse to face hounds to prevent horses kicking hounds**



- **If your horse is young and inexperienced** – Please put a green ribbon in it's tail. If you know your horse kicks, please, indicate this with a red ribbon – everyone will then know to give you plenty of room.
If your horse has a red or green ribbon, for everyone's safety, please keep to the back of the Field.



- **Keep up with, but behind the Field Master**

HUNTING HORN CALLS

We all hear the horn and this can result in varied reactions from the Field, ranging from 'Oh, that's where they are' or 'Is it time to go home'? Or in some cases 'It's music to my Ears' However, if members of the Field know what the calls mean they'll be able to enjoy the day more. Some younger Members are quickly becoming very adept with the horn, so perhaps the list showing an interpretation of calls may help everyone-

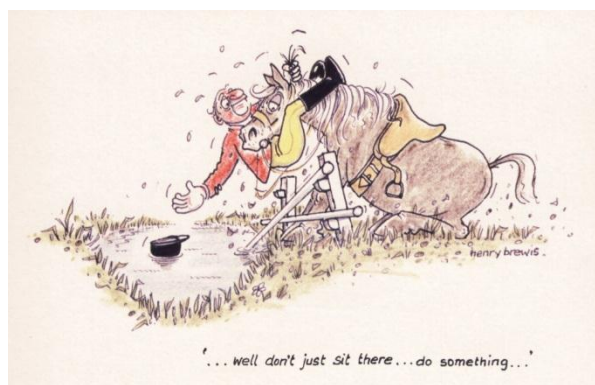

I graduated to hunting some awesome horses along with a few slightly off the wall 'chasers' but was always made welcome. I loved the Bramham Moor.

Later, I married a guy in hunt service and the rest, as they say, is history. Now in the USA, hunted all over and spent many a thrilling day out with the Galway Blazers (yikes). It's been an exciting life – all thanks to the Bramham Moor.'

A little background history to Christine's memories –

For the 1961-2 Season Major Treffrey was joined by Geoffrey Pickles and Miss Sagar Musgrave. At the end of the 1962 Season, Treffrey left the Mastership. Geoffrey Pickles and Miss Musgrave continued as joint Masters for one more Season until 1963 Geoffrey continued as sole Master for a further 6 seasons until 1969. Geoffrey did a great deal of work in the Country; especially with the farmers during this intense period of agricultural growth.

The information is also clearly stated in the Membership newsletter (Forward), which is sent quarterly, by post, to each Member. In addition, a well-attended Masters' Information Evening was dedicated to informing the Membership about the requirements of the Hunting Act 2004.

It is the intention of B&BMH Ltd. the Directors and Committee, that Masters, Huntsmen, Kennel Huntsmen, Whippers-in, Staff, Members and volunteers will hunt within the law as indicated by the Hunting Act 2004.
